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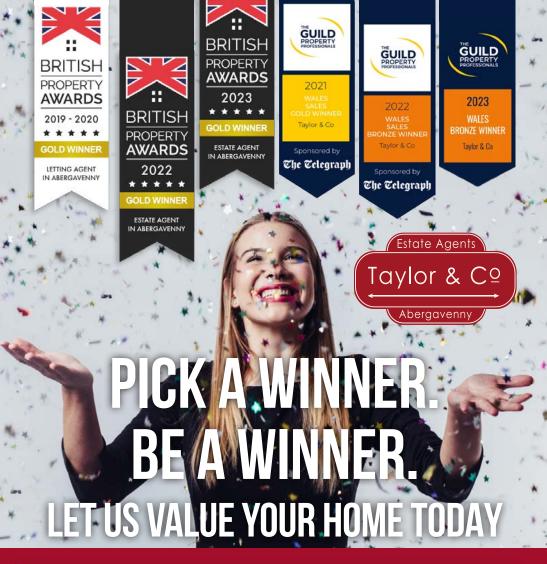
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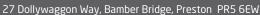














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Dear Readers,

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Bloomin' Brilliant!







Abergavenny was a first time Britain in Bloom participant and had entered the 'Town' category in high spirits, acknowledging the tough competition between them and their fellow finalists. Although they didn't clinch the top spot, Abergavenny in Bloom received a coveted Gold award.

The Royal Horticultural Society (RHS) judges recognised the exceptional work put into Abergavenny in Bloom and awarded them the Sustainable Gardening Award for embracing innovation through smart tech and creative planting schemes,



with Britain in Bloom describing their efforts as going 'above and beyond to protect the environment.'

Programmes included: a Citizen Science project carried out by volunteers and school children to monitor pollinator biodiversity, resulting in rare orchids and a black oil beetle being recorded; and an initiative piloting the use of smart technology to help tackle watering challenges.

Moisture sensors were fitted in beds and planters around the town centre, to detect when plants need water or other nutrients, and to ensure optimum conditions for growing. This information is then accessed via an online gateway, meaning water won't be wasted and volunteers will know exactly when to water them. Additionally, water butts are being installed piloting rainwater

collection from commercial premises to assist with the watering of planters.

Mariko, Paddy, Tony, Judith, and Sandra were incredibly humbled and honoured to represent Abergavenny in Bloom at this prestigious event. Huge congratulations to those volunteers and contributors in this remarkable journey and for making Abergavenny a beautiful and vibrant place to call home.

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The Gathering



ver since the announcement that ✓ Tudor Day Street Centre in Abergavenny would be knocked down, there has been a strong campaign in which protesters have voiced their concerns about these plans. For a long time Tudor Street Day Centre has been a much loved building that supported adults with learning difficulties and mental health issues.

The most recent scheme at Tudor Street was run by Monmouthshire County Council, but there are now plans to move this to another venue. As a result of the campaign to protect the most accessible venue for adults with learning difficulties and mental health issues, Cllr Ian Chandler, Head of Social Care, has spoken publicly about establishing a community group in Tudor Street run by some of the campaigners themselves.

One of the main campaigners and secretary of the community group known as The Gathering, is Sarah Griffiths (see pictured) who used to attend Tudor Street as part of My day My Life which is the name of the MCC scheme that now only caters for a smaller number of service users.

Sarah Griffiths and some of her campaigners have set up The Gathering, a community group aimed at all vulnerable people and others in the community to come and socialise, engage in activities and access vocational and training opportunities.

Owen B Lewis from The Gathering says 'The community group wants to include anyone who is vulnerable, which means it needs to be accessible for people with complex physical disabilities. There is nowhere else for them to go in Abergavenny. They need somewhere, and Tudor Street is the most fit-forpurpose building. Our amazing committee members are working on a business plan supported by Gavo. The problem, however, is the time it will take to obtain funding. As a result, and while we develop our business plan and apply for grants, we have set up a crowdfunder page in the hope that the community will get behind us and show the council that we are ready - with funds to build our community group in order to support the most vulnerable. 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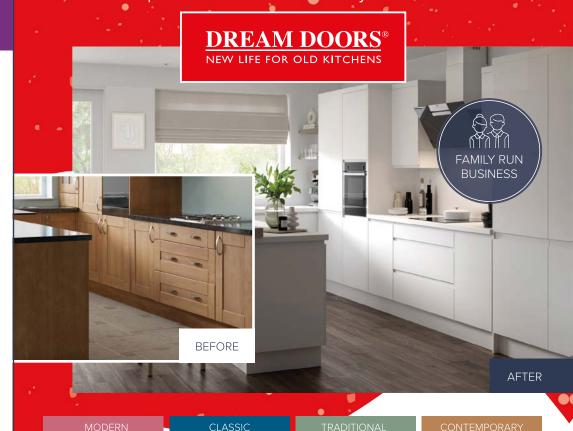
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Reflections On Linda Vista Gardens



In his next installment of our 'Reflection On' series. Tony Hopkins takes us on a wander through Linda Vista Gardens

asily accessible from the town centre, Linda Vista Gardens is an Abergavenny treasure. The house enjoys a commanding view of the Gardens and Castle Meadows, the Blorenge dominating the background.

Frederick Jenkins - humbly born in Chicken Street nearly 200 years ago – successfully sought his fortune with his brothers as a builder in Chile, returning in the 1860s. He built Linda Vista House in 1875 but, sadly soon died in his mid-forties in 1878. Bought by Major Whitehead a local ironmaster in 1911, he later married Violet, scioness of an Irish family with an impressive horticultural pedigree. She brought the gardens to maturity and, on her demise in 1957, the local council took the property over: the Gardens thus became available to all.

Private and public stewardship has resulted in a public domain of 5 acres with formal gardens descending from the house. Native and exotic bushes, herbs and flowering ground plants are arranged in ways that invite leisurely exploration. Flowering trees, blooms and bushes feature amongst rockeries, a pond, and terraces. These reflect a formal Victorian approach to the gardens.

Below and beyond this area spreads a range of trees, bushes and open areas including a bog garden and woodland glade. Impressive evergreens - conifers, spruces, and pines - are to be seen as well as oaks, hornbeams and, in season, grotesque medlar fruits. The diameters of some trees suggest they were planted about a hundred years ago. Of note is a Gingko, native to China and often referred to as a living fossil. The oldest surviving tree species, it evolved about 350 million years ago. Near the house, are two other stately trees, an evergreen Holm Oak, and a London Plane, each about 150 years old.

From 1957 the local authorities extended the area south-west of the house. It features native and exotic trees including oaks. beeches, sweet chestnuts, a Dawn Redwood, a Monkey tree, assorted cherry trees, an Indian

Bean Tree, and a Foxglove tree. The latter was cut down but clings to life - suckers with leaves have sprung from its underground roots, a veritable ghost tree! All have interesting stories to tell: the sweet chestnuts possibly date back to the Romans who first brought these trees to Britain. Behind the tearooms towers the Garden's oldest tree – a beech some 250 years old.

Home gardeners are attracted to the collection in the Arboretum. About two dozen assorted and colorful smaller trees have been planted over the last decade: they highlight trees suited to home gardens. This feature reflects the far sightedness shown and the hard work done by the Friends of Lista Vista Gardens. Established fifteen years ago, this band of volunteers do the maintenance work once done by up to three full-time gardeners, and initiate events and horticultural developments. Such efforts are a key to the Gardens' survival.

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With Christmas approaching we are advising online shoppers how to spot a scam and avoid falling prey to them.

Q - "I do most of my shopping online. I am always on the lookout for a bargain, especially with the festive season coming up but I'm worried about scammers. What should I look for, to avoid getting caught out?"

Citizens Advice says: You're not alone, lots of people do their shopping online these days, it's convenient and can save you time. But as more and more of us move online, so are scammers, with their tactics becoming more sophisticated all the time.

While scams can be tricky to recognise there are always things you can look out for and steps you can take to protect yourself from falling foul to a scammer. The golden rule to remember is that if it seems too good to be true then it probably is. This goes for products which are 'must-haves', are sold out at major retailers, or are heavily discounted.

If you're buying from a site you haven't used before, do some

research before hitting buy. Find the company's return and refund policies so you know your rights if something goes wrong with your purchase. You should also look up the company's address, this can normally be found in the website's 'contact us' section and should have a street name, not just a post office box.

Also take some time to see what other people have said about the website. Start with an internet search and look at different review websites, don't rely on reviews the company has put on its own website.

Be very wary of people contacting you out of the blue on social media or via text and email offering an item for sale or deal on something. And scammers will often ask you to pay in unusual ways, or put you under pressure to buy very quickly. For example, they'll ask you to send money through a transfer service like MoneyGram or Western Union or pay via vouchers.

If you do fall victim to a scam, firstly don't feel embarrassed or ashamed. Scammers are clever and regularly adapt their methods making them harder to spot.

Anyone can get scammed.

Secondly, do report it, this alerts authorities to scammers' techniques and prevents others from being taken advantage of. You can report a scam to Citizens Advice or Action Fraud.

If you've transferred money in the last 24 hours contact the police via the non-emergency number 101, however if you feel unsafe use 999. Also contact your bank to let them know you've transferred money, you should still do this if 24 hours have passed.

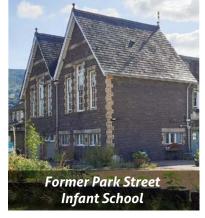

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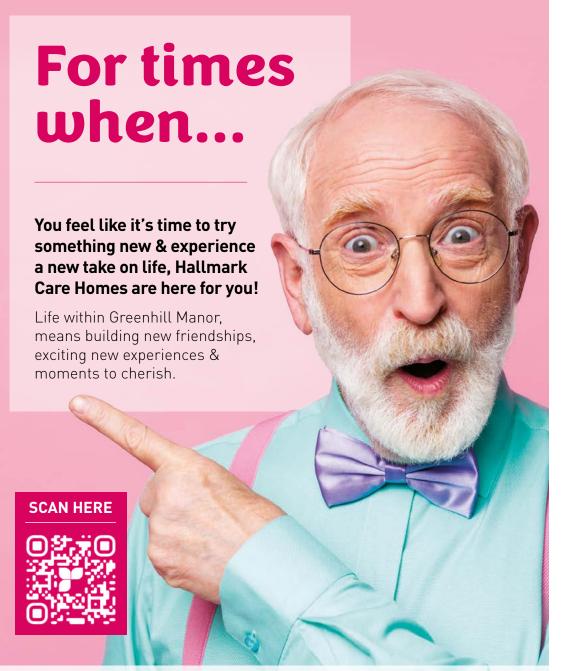
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don't know about you, but I struggle to find my mojo on cold, wet evenings to go outside in the dark or leave a warm house to go to an exercise class. One option may be to buy a house with a gym or convert an outbuilding, but as someone who prefers to exercise outdoors, I think this would be throwing money away. The temptation is to sit in front of the fire, wearing pyjamas and Ugg boots, hot chocolate in hand and watch whatever is on television. I find the less I do, the less motivated I become so I have to make a concerted effort to rise very early every morning to walk the dogs across the fields and go to the gym a couple of mornings a week. The dogs are walked a little later at the weekends, I love seeing the autumn colours and

there is nothing to beat a crisp, autumn

morning with the sun rising.











I love the feeling of shutting myself away from the wind and rain and hunkering down. The Danish use the term 'hygge' which has become very well known in recent years, a concept related to finding comfort, pleasure and warmth. Hygge interiors and way of life is often written about in interior magazines - a Danish friend once told me she changes her curtains twice a year, once for spring/summer fabrics and the other for warmer, wool based fabrics for the autumn winter.

What makes a house feel cosy? Small rather than large rooms? Squishy sofas with large cushions? A 'real' fire? Virtually every home I visit has a feature fireplace, whether that be an inglenook stone fireplace, a woodburning stove set on a hearth or a modern wall mounted gas fire. It becomes the focal point of a room - the look of it, the feeling of warmth it provides is incomparable and a room without a fire just doesn't seem so cosy during the darker winter months.

Wood burning stoves have become very popular. Often, even if a house does not have a log burning stove, a viewer will ask if one can be fitted, especially in period properties but it is becoming more fashionable in modern houses too. There has been some controversy around emissions from wood burnings stoves and since 2022 stoves have to meet environmental standards. We always recommend to a prospective buyer that they source a HETAS qualified stove installer, as part of the sales process, a HETAS certificate is more often than not reauired.

Aside from indoor fires, November brings us Bonfire Night. It's an opportunity to stand around a large fire on a cold evening, watching the flames and enjoying comforting food and, for children, toasting marshmallows while the adults mingh indulge in a winter's punch.

Most towns have organised Bonfire Night events which ensures that the fun of watching a fire can be done safely.

I thought I would share with you some photos of the fantastic fires and fireplaces from properties we have sold or are marketing – these are sure to remind you of a cosy evening, even if you don't have one in your own home.

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Comfort in a Cup

When the weather is cold, rainy and autumnal outside, there is little else more comforting than a soothing drink. Not only will it warm you from within, but the mug acts as a perfect handwarmer too. Naturally a bog standard cup of tea sipped and fully appreciated is just as good as any of the recipes here, and has its place rightfully as one of the nation's favourite drinks. but if you fancy taking a little time to mindfully prepare a warm and cosy beverage, here are some ideas we think you might enjoy.

All recipes can be substituted using milk alternatives and vegan syrups in place of honey. Each recipe makes one mug.



250ml apple juice
Strips of orange peel
½ cinnamon stick
1 clove
Sugar or honey (optional to taste)

Simmer the apple juice with the strips of orange peel, cinnamon stick and clove for 5-10 minutes until the flavours have infused. Sweeten to taste. Serve your drink with a little orange peel and a cinnamon stick if you like.



2tsp Pumpkin puree
Pinch ground cinnamon
Pinch ground ginger
Pinch ground nutmeg
30ml espresso or strong coffee
250 ml milk/milk alternative

Place puree in a large mug, stir in the spices, add the espresso or strong coffee.

Heat the milk in a pan until steaming and frothy.
Pour into mug, spoon over any froth. Stir to combine.
Add squirty cream for indulgence and sprinkle with
cinnamon.



Cocoa or hot chocolate Rose water Honey or maple syrup Pinch salt

Prepare hot chocolate or cocoa according to packet instructions for the preparation of one cup

Add ½ to 1tsp of rosewater to taste. If using cocoa, add honey or maple syrup to sweeten and a pinch of salt which will enhance the flavour. Stir to combine. Can be served with squirty cream or whipped coconut cream and edible rose petals for a touch of luxury



½ tsp Vanilla bean paste Black tea or herbal tea

Simply brew good quality black tea and add ½ tsp of vanilla bean paste to your mug after steeping your tea. Add milk and sugar as preferred.

Alternatively, if using loose leaf tea, buy a vanilla pod, scrape out the pods and cut them into small pieces, adding them to the tea container. Make tea as you normally would, and it will be delicately perfumed with the heady scent and taste of vanilla.

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Goat Cheese Salad (v)

Baby leaf salad with walnuts, cherry tomatoes, goats cheese and honey

Beef Carpaccio (gf)

Paper thin sliced beef fillet marinated with capers, olive oil, fresh lemon juice and shaved parmesan

Antipasto Misto (gf)

Selection of Italian cheese and Italian prosciutto served with pickles, rocket salad and crackers

Tomato Caprese (v)

Beef tomato stuffed with burrata, homemade pesto and fresh herbs, baked in the oven and served on a bed of rocket

Brandy King Prawns (gf)

Pan fried king prawns with garlic, chilli and fresh herbs in a creamy brandy sauce. Served with homemade bread

Butternut Squash Soup (v) (qf) (vq)

Creamy soup with butternut squash, white onion, carrots, fresh herbs, vegan cream and sage vegan butter. Served with homemade bread

Salmone al Miele

Salmon fillet marinated in honey, soy sauce, lemon juice and thyme served with roast vegetables and coriander brandy creamy sauce

Pizza Gamberi e Avocado

Pizza with brandy gorgonzola cream, baby shrimp, rocket salad, cherry tomatoes and avocado

Beef Short Rib (gf)

Slow oven-cooked beef short rib in red wine, white onion and fresh herbs. Served with homemade mash potato and homemade gravy

Lobster Tortelloni

Homemade Tortelloni pasta filled with fresh lobster meat and fresh herbs, cooked in a creamy tomato, sambuca and sage sauce

Tortelli al Cinghiale

Homemade Tortelli pasta filled with wild boar meat and fresh herbs. Served with a salad of radicchio, walnuts, brie and a touch of cream

Butternut Squash Risotto (gf) (v) (vg)

Creamy risotto cooked with creamy butternut squash

Porchetta (qf)

Rolled pork belly stuffed with delicious fresh herbs: Italian fennel, chilli flakes and fresh coriander. Served with homemade mashed potato and homemade gravy

QUAGLIA AL FORNO (gf)

Oven roasted 1/2 poussin stuffed with Italian pork sausage, herbs, red onion and chestnuts. Served with homemade mashed potato and homemade gravv



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Comforting Rituals for Cosiness and Peace

The nights are drawing in. How can you preserve your sense of inner peace and seek calm and comfort during the depths of winter? Read on for some ideas inspired by the practices of our Nordic neighbours.

Get Closer to Nature

It's well known that being in nature can help reduce stress and anxiety, but that doesn't mean you have to go to a forest, mountain, or beach. If you have a garden, just go outside,

take your shoes off, and do some deep breathing. Notice the change in temperature of the air that you're breathing in and out when you're outside compared to when you are indoors. Consider being outside at different times of the day. The guiet of the dawn hours can be both peaceful and uplifting, while stargazing on a clear crisp night can inspire a sense of awe and place.



Live in the Present

There are a certain number of activities that we do as part of daily our routine; things like eating, walking, or doing chores. Often we don't even notice them. Try

embracing these activities and immersing yourself in the experience. When making your morning cup of coffee, for example, select your favourite cup and take time to inhale the coffee and experience its comforting aroma. Notice your surroundings. Engage all your senses and observe how these small acts can induce a sense of inner peace.



Seek Human Connection

During the darker months of the year, we tend to want to retreat and hibernate, but spending time with friends and family can be an enriching experience. If you can't do

that daily or even very regularly, perhaps just consider taking a mindful break during your working day – it doesn't need to be for long – to chat and connect with a friend or work colleague. If there's time, share a cuppa together. In Sweden this is known as Fika and is a daily practice for many. Notice how this makes you feel and the gratitude you may experience through connecting with others.



The colder temperatures at this time of year, combined with fewer daylight hours can interfere with the body's circadian rhythms your internal 'clock' that regulates everything from

energy, appetite and sleep patterns. Less sunlight suppresses melotonin, the hormone that lets you fall asleep with ease.

During the colder winter months, make preparing for bed one of your comfort rituals. Try taking a warm bath before bed and perhaps add some soothing or calming essential oils like lavender to the water. Do some deep breathing or meditation before bedtime and make sure you power down your laptop and mobile phone an hour before turning out the lights to allow your mind to disconnect from the day.

We understand that river water quality is an important matter for local residents and we

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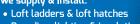

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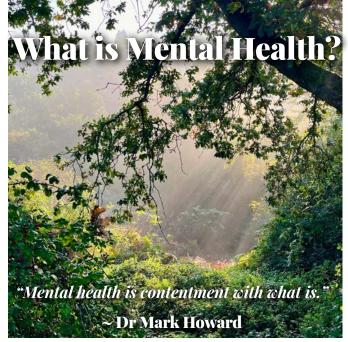
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t was World Mental Health Day last week, so on the walk to school, my daughter and I pondered this simple question. She's been doing an online wellbeing course for kids and I was curious about how she sees things now, so I asked, "What d'you reckon mental health is, sweetheart?"

A well-versed 9 year old, used to right and wrong answers, I initially got, "Well, when anything happens, you can ask yourself the question, "Does it look like something outside of me is taking away my wellbeing?" and that will tell you whether or not you're on the 'attached wellbeing path'. And that's not how it actually works."

Pretty good, in a textbook kind of way, but I wanted to know what she thought, so I asked her something a bit more abstract, "Well, where d'you reckon mental health is, then?"

She paused. "In your heart? No, ummm, your head. Oh. No. Umm, oh, I don't know!" (At this point probably wishing we could talk about *anything* other than this boring Dad stuff.)

Rounding a tree, the low autumn sun got involved in the discussion, and I pondered out loud, "Well, what if mental health was nothing to do with our bodies at all? What if it was a bit like the sun?"

"Always there, you mean, Dad?" (She's heard this metaphor before, and like you and me, needs reminding of it once in a while.)

"Exactly that. And do you think the sun needs looking after?"

"No, of course not. It looks after itself!"

"Can we always see the sun, during the daytime?"

"No, we couldn't see it first thing this morning, could we, Dad? It was covered up by the mist. It's really bright now!"

"It is! You know, maybe that's the closest we'll get to describing what mental health is: always there, doesn't need looking after, sometimes gets covered up."

"By our thinking, Dad?"

"Exactly that, kiddo." (Like I say, she knows the score.)

We walked for a while, talking about

wasps and friends and traffic lights and how awesome it is that we just saw three leaves fall off a tree all at once, when suddenly we spotted a volley of sun rays, slicing through the mist in the valley beneath our feet.

"WOWWWW!!" we exclaimed, in unison.

We stood there in silence, marvelling at the light and shade, the spiders webs glistening in the sun, the kaleidoscope of colour... and we rested *in* mental health.

Because that's the other thing about it: Mental health is always Now. It can't be anywhere or anything else, because everything else is the clouds of our thinking, obscuring our innate health. That feeling of peace — of mental health — had nothing to do with the sun, or the mist and everything to do with just being.

Being. Present. No labels. No judgement. No Dad, no daughter, no past, no future, just life, now.

To attribute this feeling to something 'outside' of the moment is the 'attached wellbeing path' all over again, and it's a slippery slope. Because before we know it, we're back at square one, where it looks like we can't experience mental health unless the conditions are just right for us: the sun has to shine, people have to be nice to us, work or school have to be going ok.

But that's not how it actually works.

There is no barrier to entry for the experience of mental health. It's waiting for us every time we fall out of our thinking *about* life and instead go about our business, at one *with* life, be that looking at trees and sunlight, fleeing wasps, waiting at traffic lights, watching leaves fall or even arguing with our friends.



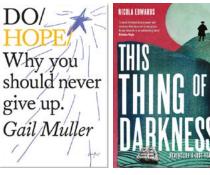
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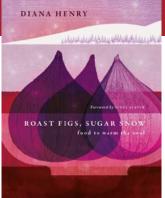




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A Vivid Legacy

In the early 20th century, photography was all the rage as practitioners took pictures of life and special occasions. Helen Morgan from Abergavenny Local History Society reports.









I chard Henry Stevens's camera was seemingly his first love and we first meet him in 1911, working from home as a photographer in Crickhowell.

By 1914, however, he had moved to 18 Monk Street in Abergavenny and was running a cafe. From here he catered for events such as the Victory Parade in the Corn Exchange in 1919. By
1921 he was living and working
at "Castle House" now known
as Abergavenny Museum. His
passion, however, continued
to be photography: snapping
Crickhowell celebrating on
Coronation day in 1911; soldiers
who arrived by train to participate
in the Territorial Army summer
camps before heading off in

hills. Thanks to RH Stevens, we know that Bwlch was one venue in 1912. His pictures document the white peaked tents of the 4th London Infantry Brigade in Talymaes near Crickhowell in 1913 and we see them marching to the drumbeat. But it was not all work. He snapped them at play: tugs of war, rolling out the barrels and visiting the pub are recorded as was rugby and riding with the hunt. When war broke out in August 1914 and with it the call to arms, Lord Kitchener appealed for volunteers who poured into Abergavenny by train from the Monmouthshire valleys. The railways that had brought TA troops to Abergavenny to training camps in the nearby hills had been commandeered by the Government to carry troops and arms to Pembroke Dock and the battlefields of World War One. Unlike today, Abergavenny was a significant railway hub with three train stations: Monmouth Road used by the Great Western Railway, Brecon Road which served LNER trains that travelled across the heads of the valleys from afar as Merthyr, and the Junction where the Merthyr trains joined the GWR line. Trains also brought wounded soldiers to convalesce, and prisoners of war to work here, as well as carrying iron to the armaments factories in the Midlands and steam coal for the Royal Navy as far north as Scapa Flow. And finally, we have the celebrations when the war ends.

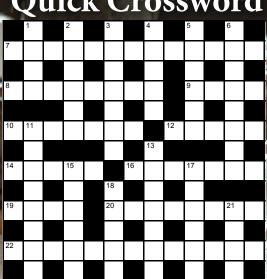

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For cake mixture you will need: BOWL 1

280g softened margarine or butter 280g dark brown sugar 5 large eggs (beaten) 1tbsp black treacle 340g plain flour

BOWL 2

680g currants
340g raisins
340g sultanas
110g ground almonds
110g mixed peel
110g chopped glace cherries
1tsp mixed spice
½ tsp ground cinnamon
Grated rind of 2 lemons
3 tbsp sherry or brandy

Suggested Toppings

Walnuts, Almonds, Brazils, Glace, Cherries, Dried Apricots, Dried Prunes, Figs etc. Apricot Jam for glaze

Last Christmas, instead of racking my brains in search of gift ideas for my work colleagues, I decided that I would bake individual Christmas Loaf cakes for them.

As I'm a keen baker I thoroughly enjoyed making them. It was an added bonus that they were both economical and looked good. These small, individual Christmas cakes went down a storm, so much so that my work colleagues have requested a repeat this year. You need to get them underway at least 6/8 weeks prior to Christmas so that the cakes fully mature and develop a good depth of flavour.

You can find disposable loaf containers in good cook shops or online. Add a gift tag and a piece of ribbon and hey presto: you have a unique, personal, hand-baked gift to give.

 $The following\ mixture\ yields\ enough\ for\ approximately\ 6\ cakes.$

- Bowl 2 Mix all ingredients together, cover and set aside overnight so that the fruit has time to plump up.
- 2. Cream together the margarine/butter and sugar in Bowl 1. Beat in the beaten eggs a little at a time (if the mixture starts to curdle add a spoonful of flour.) Once you have mixed in the eggs, add black treacle and fold in the flour. Add all the ingredients from Bowl 2 and mix thoroughly. Divide mixture into individual cake containers.
- Preheat your oven to Gas mark 3/160C/325F. Place the cakes in the oven. After 30 minutes reduce the heat to Gas mark 1-2/140C/275F. After an hour, the cakes should be golden brown, have risen nicely and feel firm to the touch. Insert a skewer into the centre of the cake if the cake is cooked it should come out clean. If not, pop the cake back into the oven for 5-10 minutes.
- 4. Leave the cakes to cool before decorating with the toppings of your choice.
- Make a glaze by melting apricot jam with a little water over a very gentle heat. Brush the glaze over your chosen cake topping and leave it to set.

Finally, cover tightly with cling film and wrap as desired.





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
