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





Provided in 1878, Crickhowell FC provides football to the communities of Crickhowell and surrounding areas for all age groups from under 6s through to senior football. The Club is aiming for women's football by the 25/26 season and to provide better accessibility to the clubhouse. However, in order to achieve this, massive changes need to be made at the club. They are now launching a campaign to improve facilities See how you can help below...

The local community is at the forefront of what we do. We want to provide association football for as many people as possible, whilst providing facilities that give the community an opportunity to enjoy a high standard of football in comfort.

Away from the football, our facilities are used by multiple other groups. Crickhowell FC host the area annual bonfire night which attracts around 1000 people from the surrounding areas. As well as the funds raised from our annual bonfire night in November, we are planning a Race Night in the Clarence Hall in Crickhowell on 19 April. We will also be fund raising at every home fixture and hosting a 5 aside tournament at the ground. We will also be applying for funds from the Cymru Football Foundation to assist with a large chunk of the development. The ground also holds the Crickhowell Car Boot sale, which is held in the dryer months of the year.

Our home pitch, the Elvicta football Ground, is the heart of our club and the community. Unfortunately we have had many setbacks with severe flooding and the lack of income like many with the COVID pandemic.

We are always looking to improve both on and off the field, but for the club to continue progressing, we need to continue to improve our home. We now want to make the ground more comfortable for spectators and more accessible for those that have mobility issues.

How we'll spend the money raised

The ground has many projects that we want to undertake but the three most significant ones are:

- Including an access ramp, as we currently have stepped access -
- Extending our current clubhouse to include additional facilities for both females and disabled ablutions.

 Increase the size of the internal/ external seating area and the bar.

he 16th Crickhowell Walking Festival ran from 9th- 17th March and was maybe the wettest yet, but though walkers were dampened, their spirits definitely were not. A programme of 81 walks, from a 2 mile riverside stroll to a 17 mile high level challenge round the Llanbedr Horseshoe, was successfully delivered for the hundreds of walkers from far and near who joined the Festival to banish their winter blues – including two who dropped in from Ottawa. Then there were the 50 hardy folk who took up the TM5 challenge – up and down Table Mountain as many as five times in the day, the youngest being ten-year old Oliver with his dad. There was also a fine selection of navigation skills' workshops and evening events. Why do all this? Hundreds of pounds were raised to help the important work of this year's annual charity, Brecon & District MIND. And of course, the Festival raised thousands for Crickhowell Resource and Information Centre. With no public funding, this is vital to sustain the Charity's work in supporting the local community, its economic health and the Arts.

Crickhowell is firmly established as one of the best and biggest British walking festivals, and all achieved by about 100 volunteers who led walks, gave talks and workshops and managed the admin behind the scenes. The CWF Committee sends a huge thank you to them all, and to the local businesses who sponsored walks. Work has already begun of fixing next year's weather and CWF 2025 will run from 8th-16th March. And now to the future and hopefully, the next 20 years...

You may recall I wrote an article a few weeks ago covering the changes within estate agency in terms of additional information now required under the Consumer Protection Act. Parts B and C for Estate Agents. Essentially all sellers are obliged to disclose any material facts relating to the property they are going to sell and agents must carry out as much due diligence as possible. This will take more time at the outset preparing a property to launch to the open market but hopefully, this approach will, hopefully, ensure there are no surprises during the conveyancing process. The more information available at the outset will also provide the seller and agent to speak to the sellers' solicitor about any potential issues that may arise and ensure these are dealt with before a buyer is found.



Although we have introduced some technology over the past 20 years, we are looking to upgrade this significantly to try and avoid duplication and streamline the process. At the moment, we ask our sellers to complete a Property Information Ouestionnaire (paper based) as part of the pre-market process, the sellers subsequently complete lengthy legal property information forms with their solicitor. We also download a Land Registry Title and Plan of the property to be sold and go through any covenants or restrictions and check the boundary plan and to confirm the registered owners. And finally, we ask our sellers to provide their Identification documents so we can comply with HMRC Anti Money Laundering legislation which requires estate agents to confirm the identity of sellers.

We are introducing a system where the seller will complete forms at the outset that are based upon the legal forms, hopefully reducing duplication and providing the sellers' solicitor with completed forms at the early part of the process. The new technology will allow the seller to download and confirm the Land Registry information is correct and also to confirm their identity. There will still be paper based forms and systems for people who would prefer to provide information this way.

This is just one example of technology we are introducing, however, our business is about people and our aim is to make us more efficient 'behind the scenes' to allow us more time to focus on our clients.

We are very proud of our showroom and offices located in the historic Nevill Street opposite St John's Square with some fantastic small businesses as our neighbours. Last year we upgraded our showroom enhancing the historic features with oak panelling and redesigning so the showroom is a comfortable environment where our clients, potential buyers and future clients can call in and discuss their property needs either sitting on the squishy sofa or in a private office. We have signed a new 10 year lease so have committed to a presence in Abergavenny town, we love being part of the community and are passionate about playing our part in keeping our beautiful town thriving whilst embracing change as our business evolves.

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Our Plot: a New Community Garden at Peak Cymru



Peak Cymru is an arts organisation based in the Black Mountains. We work from two sites: The OldSchool, Crickhowell and a small reading room on Platform 2 of Abergavenny train station. Through young people's programmes (14-30 years), community collaborations and artist residencies, we explore the unique qualities of our region including the Black Mountains, the Welsh Borders and Vale of Usk.

This year, we're developing a community garden for the former playground and car park of The Old School, Crickhowell. Over the past three months we've been working with a small group of Young People from our previous programmes to develop a set of principles to creatively steer the garden. Young People told us they want the garden to be: 'a place to grow things we love,' an artist's studio', 'to not have any clocks' and to be 'allowed to be imperfect'!

This Spring, we launch Play/Ground - a series of creative workshops for 14-18 year olds to experiment with artistic and design practices and to learn green skills. Hosted by artist and designer Sahra Hersi, and working alongside a variety of creative practitioners, designers, farmers and ecologists, the group will meet every month between May and October to imagine and design an element of the community garden. Alongside this, a parallel programme, Our Plot, will host regular sessions for local residents of all ages to join a range of creative and therapeutic activities, working towards an Autumn harvest feast.

We look forward to sharing this growing space with as many people as possible throughout the coming seasons, and to celebrate nature, creativity and collaboration in all its forms. To get in involved with either group, please email *polly@peak.cymru*. Each Young Person taking in *Play/ Ground* is offered a bursary to support travel and expenses.

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Bluebells in Bloom

egend has it that a field or wood full of bluebells is intricately woven with fairy enchantments, with fairies trapping anyone passing by, particularly children. It's unsurprising that a wealth of folklore surrounds these flowers, given that carpets of flowering bluebells are one of the most beautiful events in nature's calendar.

There are two types of bluebell to be found in the UK – native bluebells and Spanish bluebells and April & May are the time to get out and see them. They are a distinctive deep violet-blue flower with a nodding head and petal tips that curl back.

The best places to find bluebells are in ancient woodlands where a rich habitat supports a range of species. Bluebells are important flowers for bees, hoverflies and butterflies, which feed on their nectar.

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
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Prevention is Better than Cure! Strengthening your upper back and neck can help prevent rounded shoulders and poor posture

ost of us know that Pilates is proven to help with core strength, balance, and mobility but did you know that it can also help with vour posture? As we age, habits we've picked up from long hours working at a desk, looking at screens and devices, or tending to young children and animals means that we spend much of our lives bent over with our shoulders rounded and our heads in a forward position. Over time this can develop into a 'widows stoop' with the head and chin leading the way and



The exercise below is one of my favourites to help strengthen the upper back and shoulders and with

practice it can also help to relieve tension and pain in the upper back. Future proofing our bodies is one of my main goals, so that we can remain healthy and strong in our later years. I teach this exercise regularly in my local classes but you can also learn with me by joining my online community. It's an easy and affordable way to incorporate Pilates into your daily life and your body will thank you for taking the time to look after it. 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Lying on your front, arms at a 90 degree angle from your shoulder to elbow and elbow to wrist. Forehead and arms resting on the floor. Relax the whole body. Imagine an ice cube under your bellybutton and gently draw your tummy muscles up and away from the ice cube.



Take a breath in and as you exhale, lift your arms and head no more than 1 inch off the mat. Keep looking at the floor rather than lifting your chin. Just make sure you don't squeeze your bottom to help you. The arms and head should feel very heavy as you're using just your upper back and neck to hold this position.



Take another breath in to hold and then as you exhale, draw your elbows towards your ribcage making sure the arms stay no more than 1 inch off the mat. They should just skim the floor. You are holding the weight of the head and arms as before and making sure you switch off the rest of the body.



As you inhale, extend your arms over your head like Superman. Once again, keeping close to the floor. It's important that you don't lift the back up high or strain but keep it small, Less is always more in Pilates. If your shoulders are tight or painful, take your arms to a wider V shape like the next picture.



It doesn't matter how far your arms reach, just keep moving them and bit by bit your mobility will improve with practice and consistency. All the while that little ice cube stays under the belly button and you want to keep your tummy away from it. Your lower body remains relaxed throughout.



Now repeat the sequence 6 times. Drawing the elbows right back towards the ribs as you exhale (pulling the shoulder blades down and away from your ears) and then extending them long over your head as you inhale. It's as if you're dusting the floor while you move the arms back and forth.



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

But the security system has also wiped everyone's memories of exactly what happened the night before, which means that someone on the island is a murderer - and they don't even know it.




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

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
